More specifically, we will describe and interpret the procedures put in place by sociologists to “make sense” of social world, how the latter correspond to presuppositions on the nature and on the functioning of social reality itself.<br>The choice and sense of a method depends namely on the variation of studied contexts (individual, interaction, structure, rationality, network). At last, we must reflect on the overtaking of dualisms and cleavages to seize what recovers interdisciplinarity. |
