Objective	This seminar aims to provide students with the methodological knowledge and skills required to produce a Master's thesis that meets the academic standards of the discipline of International Relations. It covers the main stages of the research process, including identifying and using relevant sources, formulating a research question, reviewing the literature, conceptualization, developing a research problem, and structuring a research project. Particular emphasis is placed on qualitative research methods.
Content	Key texts on the evolution of methodological debates within the discipline of International Relations are read and discussed interactively. The course then covers the main stages of the research process, including topic selection and delimitation, identifying and formulating a research problem, formulating research questions and hypotheses, conducting a literature review, and structuring a research project. The course also covers qualitative research methods, especially content analysis and discourse analysis. Case studies and practical exercises familiarise students with applying these methods.
